DEPARTMENT REPORTS/EMERGING ISSUES

Sheriff Scholl:

- Over 4th of July, only one arrest.
- Staffing changes to make for better weekend coverage.
- PSO Barbara Smith has turned in her retirement papers after 20 years.
- One Deputy looking to leave and work at Bishop PD.
- The Sheriff's Dept. will be looking to fill positions in the near future; would like the Board to keep this need in mind.
- Supervisor Hazard: emphasized the important relationship between the Deputies and the Dispatchers.

Jeff Walters:

- Auction (Surplus Sale) this past weekend: sold all vehicles and most of the equipment, brought in \$55,000. Most successful sale yet.
- Existing fuel tank in Social Services where contamination was found; they are now awaiting word from Lahontan Water Quality Control Board to see what action needs to be taken.

Ann Gimpel:

- Mike Lear, Alcohol and Drug counselor turned in retirement papers; his last day is Friday.
- Alcohol and Drug Dept. really needs this position, even with the hiring freeze.
- Will be on August agenda.

Lynda Roberts:

- Outside agency requests to have items put on the agenda: she put together some guidelines that can be sent/mailed to these individuals; trying to have consistency.
- Foreclosure Report that she provides quarterly (handed out report). This one is from January – June 2008, 2009 and 2010. Gave brief overview.
- Board Member Field Trip to Conway Ranch in the Fall – go September 7th or 14th or October? Maybe afternoon. She will work with Dave on date and time.
- Evening meeting in August on the 17th in Crowley? Is that correct? She will reserve, plan for that.

Marshall Rudolph:

- Latest update on Bridgeport Indian Colony to get legislative transfer of Land. Handed out Bill from Congressman McKeon. A similar Senate version might be able to be produced. Right now it's at the Natural Resources Committee. (Handout kept in meeting folder for today.)
- State Legislature did approve the Bill amending the Government Code to allow County Boards of Supervisors to hold regular meetings outside of the county seat. Not urgency legislation, wouldn't take effect until January 2011.

Stacey Simon:

- Fred Fulstone – FIM Corporation – he was denied some of his grazing allotments and only has 15 out of 17 grazing allotments right now. He was going to seek a letter of support to appeal this. At last minute, Fred Fulstone asked that the item be removed. They have offered him the possibility of grazing cattle on the three allotments he doesn't currently have.
- Supervisor Peters: informed by Grace Newell that they had reached an agreement with Fred.

Brian Muir:

- For the budget process, where various groups are awarded money; they have been sent the new policy.
- Investments: Bond market has rallied significantly; rates go down; he is cash heavy right now. They have found some corporates that look good but exposure is limited. Bottom line: they are looking now but if they don't find things, they will just sit on it and look again next week.
- He and two assistants took new Finance Director for the Mammoth Community Water District, Sandra Hagaman, to lunch. They offered support and services to her.
- Started to extend the roll. No longer have unitary roll (it comes on a disk); in looking at roll as it exists right now, overall the county has dropped 7.3%.
- Supervisor Peters: have individual districts gotten new budget policy on money being given to outside groups?
- Supervisor Hazard: any speculation as to additional corrections/reductions? Wants to feel comfortable going into the budget cycle.
- Brian doesn't think there will be a lot of changes because roll corrections have been ongoing.

Action: Approve and authorize County Counsel to sign and serve Second Notice of Termination of Lease between Mammoth Dog Teams and Mono County, effectively extending the termination date of the Lease by 60 days (from July 16, 2010 until September 14, 2010).

Bauer/Farnetti 5-0

Stacey Simon:

- A Notice of Termination was sent to current lessee approximately 120 days ago. Expires on July 16th.
- In looking at timelines and receipt of new proposals, etc., more time is needed. Seems unlikely this can happen by July 16th, she recommends to extend an additional 90 days.
- She feels 60 days is reasonable; it may be that there ends up being an additional extension.
- As it's currently posted, the deadline is July 16th.

Supervisor Comments:

- Worried about the timeline cutting too close to winter.
- Knows there are other interested parties.
- Ok with 60 days; concerned with the proposed expansion of space/use for the property.
- Mammoth Dog Sleds have been dragging its feet.

Kelly Garcia:

- She has received two phone calls: Mammoth Dog Sleds and Mammoth Brewery. Mammoth Brewery needs more space than what is being offered.

6b) Comments on the Pacific Crest Trail Crossing Project (Stacey Simon) -
Comments on the proposed Pacific Crest Trail Crossing Project, Bridgeport
Ranger District, Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest.

M10-158 **Action:** Approve and authorize the Chair to sign letter to the Bridgeport Ranger District, Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest - ***as modified*** - containing the County's comments on the proposed Pacific Crest Trail Crossing Project as described in the Notice of Proposed Action.

Hazard/Bauer 5-0

Stacey Simon:

- This item is for Board discussion. The proposed route did not print on agenda packet but if anyone needs it she has one in her office.
- Notice of Proposed Action issued several weeks ago. Comments not due until July 23rd.
- Supervisor Peters requested this item be brought to board.
- Four Components: (1) Primary alternative, route crosses Pacific Crest Trail at two locations; (2) Daily permit for motorized users using the crossing area; (3) Closure date for PCT Crossing Route and BWRA; (4) County and Public role in decision making.
- Was told that this plan would be revisited in one year.
- Certain decisions have already been made in the management plan.
- In looking back at dates, started in 04 and was completed in 05; needs to be corrected.
- Egress comment: she could add ingress AND egress.
- Only thing at issue is the daily permits at this point.
- Remove "in the future" from point 4.
- Stacey suggested an additional letter that lays out expectations in the Board's participation in anything that affects the management plan.

Came back in the afternoon:

- Clarified several points with the Board and read revised wording.

Supervisor Hazard:

- Forest Service has created their own trail, creating a new area that would be managed by them; it wasn't part of the original discussion. Now PCT is inside a managed area, where they originally were not.
- In meeting with public to work on management plan, should it be "a" crossing (one time), or more than once. In the meantime, there are permit discussions.
- Permit Issue now created by a third party – daily, seasonal, how should you access it? A permitting system opens the door for problems later on.
- Board needs to weigh in on this. Egress issue for snowmobilers, 108 closure is not a good gauge. He supports sending the proposed letter.
- We should invoke a standard that is higher than normal. He would like to strengthen point 4 on letter; suggesting they go back to the table on this. Need to state we are part of the working group.

Supervisor Peters:

- It's not acceptable that we may not be able to use these routes as originally intended.
- Forest Service doesn't really know how they are going to enforce this.
- Suggests that we insert "without user fee" in this permitting process.

Supervisor Bauer:

- We certainly don't want to gum up the works.
- The crossings are what we wanted.
- Instead of complaining about process, let's make a specific request: she doesn't read proposed letter this way. We need to add that we need to specifically state that our Board wants to be at the table.

Tim Hansen:

- Can't see having an arbitrary closure because each year is so different.
- People should be able to ride as long as conditions last.
- We shouldn't give anything up.

Tony Dublino:

- As a resident of Bridgeport, on the issue of permitting, he assumed it was a free permit that would be issued; in the letter it references "costly program"; maybe this needs to be clarified.
- Cost to user or Forest Service?

7a) PUBLIC HEARING Approval of Tentative Tract Map 10-002 / Eilts (Tony Dublino) - Public hearing regarding approval of Tentative Tract Map 10-002 / Eilts--Falls Creek Ranch.

M10-159 **Action:** (A) In adopting the CEQA document: 1. Find that the proposed project is consistent with the Mono County General Plan. 2. Find that the Mono County General Plan EIR (1993) and the General Plan Land Use Element Update Environmental Impact Report (2000) analyzed the potential impacts of development provided for in the Hammil Valley Area Plan, including the development proposed for the subject parcel. 3. Find that the Environmental Analysis for Tentative Tract Map 10-002 may examine only those environmental effects that are peculiar to the project and which were not addressed as significant effects in the Mono County General Plan EIRs, unless substantial

new information shows that those effects will be more significant than described in the prior Environmental Impact Reports. (Public Resources Code Section 21083.3 and CEQA Guidelines Section 15183.) 4. Find that uniformly applied development policies or standards (i.e., General Plan/Area Plan policies or other development standards) have been applied to the project and that the policies or standards will substantially mitigate potential environmental effects that were not addressed as significant effects in the prior Environmental Impact Reports to a less-than-significant level. 5. Adopt the Environmental Analysis for the Tentative Tract Map 10-002, which was prepared in accordance with Public Resources Code Section 21083.3 and CEQA Guidelines Section 15183. 6. Find that the feasible mitigation measures identified in the Mono County General Plan will be applied to this project. (B) Make a finding that the proposed project is in conformance with the approved Master Plan allocating development credits, and approve distribution of one development credit per parcels 1, 2, and 4, two development credits for parcel 3, and no development credits for the letter lot. (C) Adopt the Findings for the Tentative Tract Map 10-002 as contained in the project staff report. (D) Approve Tentative Tract Map 10-002 subject to the Conditions of Approval (Attachment B) and Mitigation Monitoring Program as contained in the project staff report.

Hazard/Bauer 5-0

Tony Dublino (powerpoint):

- Passed out information to be made part of “official record”.
- Approval of Tentative Tract Map 10-002/Eilts-Falls Creek Ranch
- Project History (timeline)
- Subdivision Map Act requires that this be called a Tentative Tract Map which is why this is at the Board today
- Current proposal – went over map
- Site Photos
- Feedback to date (concerns addressed by Condition 33 and 34)
- Lingering Issues to be resolved before Final Map Approval: ultimately saying the CC&R conditions will be recorded as part of the map: Housing Mitigation Agreement and Cal Trans Encroachment Permit
- Department of Fish and Game prompted several changes that ARE included in “final record” today

Questions?

- Utilities issue: right now does not require the placement of conduit.
- Discussed Hammil Valley credits program. They are not going beyond original credits, they are expending them. He feels new plan is in line with what was originally intended.
- Plan doesn't specifically call out two separate septic systems; environmental health does require the identification of a primary and a replacement septic system.
- CalTrans has not expressed any problems with the encroachment itself.

Scott Burns:

- General Plan is just that ‘general’. Could add to it regarding conduit.
- This development system was set up years ago. It's hard to get back to the origin of what was intended.
- Alternative to consuming more AG land – taxes?

Stacey Simon:

- She suggests that the emails back and forth NOT be part of the record. Stacey to collect all copies.

Supervisor Hazard:

- He has a series of questions: having conduit laid for future communications? He doesn't see that in the current document?
- General plan – we have a responsibility to protect AG areas, this seems contrary to that. Can property be deed restricted?
- We've taken a piece of property zoned long ago – how do we get back to the original intent?
- Septic issues?
- Can language be placed on the Tract Map to help protect AG land?
- He's concerned that we've required certain things from other property owners, etc. that we may not be requiring here. He's looking for consistency in how these things are handled.

Marshall Rudolph:

- A lot of legal issues coming up that might not be able to be addressed today; County Counsel may need some time to do some research.
- Conduit issue could be addressed with a General Plan policy change.

Debbie Eilts:

- She doesn't agree with the "let it blow" statement but she and her husband do support the Hammil Plan.
- They have never sat down with the Hammil community to discuss the plan.
- She thinks that they have worked within the plan.
- Confused by mitigation/deed restriction issues.
- She feels the project and their intent works with the plan.

8a) Legal Notice Request for Proposals (Mary Booher and Lynda Roberts) -
Presentation by Mary Booher and Lynda Roberts regarding Request for
Proposals for Legal Notice Publications.

None. **Action:** None. The Board asked for additional information to be brought back
to the Board, maybe in August.

Mary Booher:

- Decided to do an RFP (to Mammoth Times and the Sheet) process to see who would publish legal public notices when required.
- They both submitted proposals.
- She went over specifics of each proposal.
- Staff is recommending to award the bid to Mammoth Times due mostly to overall cost.
- Both papers make legal publications available on websites at no charge.
- Should she try to negotiate with the Sheet to get the cost of both papers more equal?
- This can be brought back with more information later.

Heather McKie, Mammoth Times Publisher:

- Staff has done a very thorough job with their analysis.
- She went through some of the stats given by both Mammoth Times and the Sheet.
- She feels paid circulation is easily verified.
- All legals published with the Times can be viewed for free.

Ted Carlton (The Sheet):

- Sheet has more readership, period.
- Anyone who wants to look at a legal publication will have to buy a paper if the Board chooses the Times. With the Sheet, it's free. Potentially in the best interest of the citizen's to see it for free.
- He's local, Horizon Publications is not.

Supervisor Bauer:

- Was wondering about the price of the bids and what Mammoth Times has charged in the past?
- Does it make sense to award a bid in light of competition/pricing issues?
- She really would like to see it in both papers; she wants to not have a bid but just be billed as needed as we have been.

Supervisor Farnetti:

- Both publications have advantages.
- He thinks there are likely more readers with the Sheet.
- Is willing to go with a one year contract with the Times.

Supervisor Peters:

- Doesn't have advantage of reading publications very often.
- Feels they have to go with low bid on this go around.
- Interested in internet hits.

Supervisor Hazard:

- He reads both publications.
- He misses getting the Sheet if he doesn't get them quickly.
- He doesn't think we should be paying at all, should be a public service announcement.
- Would like to see cost of The Sheet come down.
- Go with the Times, one year contract.

Supervisor Hunt:

- Should be in both papers.
- Proceed today with one year contract with the Times.
- Instructs staff to look into how we can use both papers.

Lynda Roberts:

- She only pulled together information, didn't really do an "analysis".

Theresa Brooks, Business Manager, Mammoth Times:

- Historically, price never exceeded \$10 based on averages.

Lynda Salcido:

- Recap of H1N1 in 2009
- It was amazing that with a staff of 24, how many individuals they were able to vaccinate.

Dr. Rick Johnson (powerpoint):

- Context – first wave: April – June 2009
- Initial media hysteria
- Jul – Sep 2009 – a season of anticipation and waiting
- Summary
- August 13, 2009, Mono County Public Health Influenza Planning Meeting
- Seasonal vaccine priority groups vs. 2009 pandemic H1Na vaccine priority groups
- Goals of Community Measures
- Declaration of Local Health Emergency on September 8, 2009 – began "Operation Flu Stomper"

- More planning meetings
- Opened Operation Center
- Updated Key Points/Situation Status Reports
- Epi and Surveillance, for three months they daily measured certain things
- Statistics shown
- Public Information: Public Health Mono-Gram, etc.
- Lessons learned

Board Comments:

- Efficiency due to smallness?
- Any indication of what will happen this winter?
- Compliments to the Health Department for all hard work.
- What if we were to have a massive epidemic/pandemic? Is there a plan in place?
- Why did we reach so many Hispanics? Since we did reach them for the H1N1 vaccine, we should not let the door close.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT - PLANNING DIVISION

Additional Departments: Finance, County Counsel, Public Works

10a) Development Impact Fee Update (Scott Burns) - Consider authorizing funding for update of development impact fee ordinance.

M10-160 **Action:** Authorize \$20,000 to update the Development Impact Fee (DIF) ordinance.

Farnetti/Hazard 4-1: Bauer

Scott Burns:

- Renew impact fees or not? Carry over from mid-year budget review.
- Adopted in November, 5 years ago so action needs to be taken soon in order to renew before it expires.

Brian Muir:

- This is one of those things we have to do by law. We either update the fees or the County is left vulnerable.
- We could do it internally but the problem is one of credibility.
- His recommendation is that if we can update for \$20,000 we should just go ahead and do it.
- This would be general fund money; this study would look at work done in past five years and determine fees, etc.

Marshall Rudolph:

- Key language, second page of attachment A, subdivision(d)(1) of Section 66001: after five years, for the money you have collected, you need to reconfirm that the original purposes remain true. In the course of doing that you are also validating the future fees.
- If you can't reconfirm, you need to give money back (applies to money already collected).
- Impact fees only cover new development's share of costs; existing development's share must come from the general fund or other sources. Accordingly, the amount of money available from a maximum build-out will almost never be sufficient to cover the entire cost of a facility or service.
- You don't have to save up money until you have enough to do 100% of the projects. In

the meantime, you can spend your money for chunks of your project.

Supervisor Hunt:

- He personally supports it, we need the analysis.

Supervisor Hazard:

- We need to focus on what is really going to impact us, not superfluous things.

Supervisor Bauer:

- We have a chance to go backwards now and undo some of this.
- The scope shouldn't be changed, it would be like starting over.
