INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS

To vote for a candidate whose name appears on the ballot, CONNECT THE HEAD AND TAIL OF THE ARROW WHICH POINTS to the right of the candidate's name. Where two or more candidates for the same office are to be elected, CONNECT THE HEAD AND THE TAIL OF THE ARROW WHICH POINTS to the right of the names of all candidates for the office for whom you desire to vote, not to exceed, however, the number of candidates to be elected.

To vote for a qualified WRITE-IN candidate, write in the person's name in the blank space provided for that purpose after the names of the other candidates for the same office and CONNECT THE HEAD AND TAIL OF THE ARROW WHICH POINTS to the right of the name you have written in, or your vote will not be counted.

To vote on any measure, CONNECT THE HEAD AND TAIL OF THE ARROW WHICH POINTS to the word "YES" or the word "NO."

REVIEW YOUR BALLOT: Mark your ballot completely

- If you vote for more candidates than allowed, or if you vote both Yes and No on a measure, it is called an overvote. Your vote will not count for that candidate or measure.
- You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still count. This is called undervoting.

If you make a mistake, wrongly mark, tear, or deface any portion of your ballot, return it to the Precinct Board Member and obtain another ballot.

AFTER YOU HAVE COMPLETED VOTING, retain the numbered stub and deposit your voted ballot into the ballot box.

On Election Day the polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

Important Voter Information

NEW TOP-TWO CANDIDATES OPEN PRIMARY ACT

Under the Top-Two Candidates Open Primary Act, approved by the voters in 2010, only the two candidates who received the top number of votes for U.S. Senate, 8th Congressional and 5th State Assembly districts will appear on the General Election Ballot. These offices appear on your ballot under the heading **Voter-Nominated Offices**. Candidates for these offices may have the same political party preference. Additionally, write-in candidates are no longer allowed for these contests at the General Election. For more information you may contact the Mono County Elections Office at **760-932-5537** or elections@mono.ca.gov.

VOTE-BY-MAIL PRECINCTS

If you reside in a vote-by-mail precinct, you are not assigned to a polling place and you will receive your Official Ballot through the mail. You should receive your ballot approximately three weeks before the election. If you do not, please contact the Mono County Elections Office immediately by calling 760-932-5537.

VOTE-BY-MAIL: OPTIONS FOR RETURNING YOUR BALLOT

In order for your vote to count, your ballot must be received no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day (postmark won't suffice); must be in the Vote-by-Mail return envelope; and return envelope must be signed. Return options:

- Mail your voted ballot as soon as possible prior to the election. **Ensure correct postage is on your return envelope; check with the post office.**
- Return your voted ballot in person, sealed in the envelope provided, to the County Elections Official (County Clerk-Recorder-Registrar) or one of her deputies at either of the following offices:
 - Main office in Bridgeport (County Clerk's Office, 74 School Street, Annex 1), Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; on Election Day 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
 - Satellite location at County Offices in Mammoth Lakes, 437 Old Mammoth Road Suite P (2nd floor Minaret Village Mall above Giovanni's Pizzeria), prior to Election Day, Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- On Election Day, return your voted ballot in person (sealed in the envelope provided) to an elections official at any Mono County polling place, prior to close of polls at 8:00 p.m.

A vote-by-mail voter who, because of illness or other physical disability, is unable to return their ballot in person, may designate his or her spouse, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, or a person residing in the same household as the vote-by-mail voter to return their ballot.

Don't Delay—Vote and Mail Today!

Vote-by-Mail applications must be received by the Elections Office no later than October 30, 2012 (postmark will not suffice).

PROVISIONAL VOTING AT POLLING PLACE

The provisional voting process is available to assist voters whose eligibility to vote cannot be determined at the polling place. Provisional voters will be given instructions for voting at the polling place. Reasons for provisional voting:

- The voter's name is not listed on the Roster of Voters.
- The voter has moved within the County but did not re-register to vote.
- The voter's name is listed on the Roster of Voters as having received a vote-by-mail ballot but, for whatever reason, is unable to surrender the ballot.
- The voter is listed on the Roster of Voters as a First Time Federal Election Voter and is required to show proof of identification, but is unable to show proof.



ACCESSIBLE POLLING PLACES

The Mono County Elections Office makes every effort to secure polling places that are accessible to the elderly and to voters with disabilities. If an asterisk (*) follows the designation of your polling place on the back cover of this booklet, it is an accessible polling place. If you are unable to access your polling place, a precinct officer can bring a ballot to you at a place which is accessible, as near to the polling place as possible. In addition, all voters are entitled to Permanent Vote-by-Mail status. If you wish to claim Permanent Vote-by-Mail status, check the appropriate box on the Vote-by-Mail Ballot Application on the back cover of this booklet, and return it to the Mono County Elections Office. **For this election, applications must be received by the Elections Office no later than October 30, 2012 (postmark will not suffice).**

DO NOT USE RED INK OR FELT TIP PEN

If you make a mistake marking your ballot, return it to the Election Official and a replacement ballot will be issued.

PARTY-NOMINATED OFFICES

The party label accompanying the name of a candidate for party-nominated office on the general election ballot means that the candidate is the official nominee of the party shown.

VOTER-NOMINATED AND NONPARTISAN OFFICES

All voters, regardless of the party preference they disclosed upon registration, or refusal to disclose a party preference, may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated or nonpartisan office. The party preference, if any, designated by a candidate for a voter-nominated office is selected by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not imply that the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party or that the party approves of the candidate. The party preference, if any, of a candidate for a nonpartisan office does not appear on the ballot.

MEASURES SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS

30

TEMPORARY TAXES TO FUND EDUCATION. GUARANTEED LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY FUNDING. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Increases taxes on earnings over \$250,000 for seven years and sales taxes by ¼ cent for four years, to fund schools. Guarantees public safety realignment funding. Fiscal Impact: Increased state tax revenues through 2018-19, averaging about \$6 billion annually over the next few years. Revenues available for funding state budget. In 2012-13, planned spending reductions, primarily to education programs, would not occur.

STATE BUDGET. STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AND STATUTE. Establishes two-year state budget. Sets rules for offsetting new expenditures, and Governor budget cuts in fiscal emergencies. Local governments can alter application of laws governing state-funded programs. Fiscal Impact: Decreased state sales tax revenues of \$200 million annually, with corresponding increases of funding to local governments. Other, potentially more significant changes in state and local budgets, depending on future decisions by public officials.

32 **POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS BY PAYROLL DEDUCTION. CONTRIBUTIONS TO CANDIDATES. INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Prohibits unions from using payroll-deducted funds for political purposes. Applies same use prohibition to payroll deductions, if any, by corporations or government contractors. Prohibits union and corporate contributions to candidates and their committees. Prohibits government contractor contributions to elected officers or their committees. Fiscal impact: Increased costs to state and local government, potentially exceeding \$1 million annually, to implement and enforce the measure's requirements.

33 **AUTO INSURANCE COMPANIES. PRICES BASED ON DRIVER'S HISTORY OF INSURANCE COVERAGE. INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Changes current law to allow insurance companies to set prices based on whether the driver previously carried auto insurance with any insurance company. Allows proportional discount for drivers with some prior coverage. Allows increased cost for drivers without history of continuous coverage. Fiscal impact: Probably no significant fiscal effect on state insurance premium tax revenues.

MEASURES SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS

STATE

34 DEATH PENALTY, INITIATIVE STATUTE.

Repeals death penalty and replaces it with life imprisonment without possibility of parole. Applies retroactively to existing death sentences. Directs investigations of homicide and rape cases. Fiscal Impact: Ongoing state and county criminal justice savings of about \$130 million annually within a few years, which could vary by tens of millions of dollars. One-time state costs of \$100 million for local law enforcement grants.

35 HUMAN TRAFFICKING, PENALTIES, INITIATIVE STATUTE.

Increases prison sentences and fines for human trafficking convictions. Requires convicted human traffickers to register as sex offenders. Requires registered sex offenders to disclose Internet activities and identities. Fiscal Impact: Costs of a few million dollars annually to state and local governments for addressing human trafficking offenses. Potential increased annual fine revenue of a similar amount, dedicated primarily for human trafficking victims.

36 THREE STRIKES LAW, REPEAT FELONY OFFENDERS, PENALTIES, INITIATIVE STATUTE.

Revises law to impose life sentence only when new felony conviction is serious or violent. May authorize re-sentencing if third strike conviction was not serious or violent. Fiscal Impact: Ongoing state correctional savings of around \$70 million annually, with even greater savings (up to \$90 million) over the next couple of decades. These savings could vary significantly depending on future state actions.

37 GENETICALLY ENGINEERED FOODS, LABELING, INITIATIVE STATUTE.

Requires labeling of food sold to consumers made from plants or animals with genetic material changed in specified ways. Prohibits marketing such food, or other processed food, as "natural." Provides exemptions. Fiscal Impact: Increased annual state costs from a few hundred thousand dollars to over \$1 million to regulate the labeling of genetically engineered foods. Additional, but likely not significant, governmental costs to address violations under the measure.

38 **TAX TO FUND EDUCATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAMS INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Increases taxes on earnings using sliding scale, for twelve years. Revenues go to K-12 schools and early childhood programs, and for four years to repaying state debt. Fiscal Impact: Increased state tax revenues for 12 years—roughly \$10 billion annually in initial years, tending to grow over time. Funds used for schools, child care, and preschool, as well as providing savings on state debt payments.

39 **TAX TREATMENT FOR MULTISTATE BUSINESSES. CLEAN ENERGY AND ENERGY EFFICIENCY FUNDING INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Requires multistate businesses to pay income taxes based on percentage of their sales in California. Dedicates revenues for five years to clean/efficient energy projects. Fiscal Impact: Increased state revenues of \$1 billion annually, with half of the revenues over the next five years spent on energy efficiency projects. Of the remaining revenues, a significant portion likely would be spent on schools.

40 **REDISTRICTING. STATE SENATE DISTRICTS. REFERENDUM.** A "Yes" vote approves, and a "No" vote rejects, new State Senate districts drawn by the Citizens Redistricting Commission. If rejected, districts will be adjusted by officials supervised by the California Supreme Court. Fiscal Impact: Approving the referendum would have no fiscal impact on the state and local governments. Rejecting the referendum would result in a one-time cost of about \$1 million to the state and counties.

However, a voter who, because of illness or other physical disability, is unable to return his/her ballot, may designate his or her spouse, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister or a person residing in the same household as the vote by mail voter, to return the ballot to the election official or polling place.

NOTICE TO THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED VOTER

If the polling place is not designated as accessible to the physically handicapped voter, such voter may request a vote by mail ballot by completing the application on reverse side, or a precinct board member shall take a regular ballot to the physically handicapped person at a place as near as possible to the polling place and which is accessible to such person, qualify that person to vote and return the voted ballot to the polling place. (California Elections Code Section 14282.)

PERMANENT VOTE BY MAIL VOTER STATUS

State law now allows any voter who so requests to be a Permanent Vote by Mail Voter. If you check the Permanent Vote by Mail Voter box on the Application for a Vote by Mail Ballot on reverse side, a vote by mail ballot will automatically be sent to you for future elections. Failure to vote in four consecutive statewide general elections will cancel your Permanent Vote by Mail Voter Status and you will need to reapply.
