What if anything did you learn from being a participant on this panel?

I have been a vote-by-mail voter for years so have not been in a polling place for a vey long time. I learned that the process is well organized and supportive of voters exercising their right to vote. I also learned that things have improved significantly since the last time I voted at a polling place.

Did you feel confident in our administration at the Counting Center and/or would you change anything?

Katherine Anderson and Dinah Frincke. did an outstanding job of keeping things running smoothly throughout the day. They were hands-on and present to help poll workers problem-solve, and available for questions and support. The poll workers were well-trained. I was impressed with how friendly, patient and helpful they were, especially at the Provisional table, where voters had unique situations.

Do you think the polling place(s) you visited had adequate instructions for understanding how to obtain your ballot, vote your ballot, and submit your ballot for processing? Please explain.

Yes. Upon entering the room, voters encountered helpful workers who greeted them and helped them find their way to their precincts. At the precinct tables, workers did an outstanding job of explaining the process to each voter, pointing their way to the voting booth and then to the scanning machines. There was little to no confusion that I could see.

Did you feel confident that your right to vote was being encouraged and protected at the polling place? Please explain.

Yes, absolutely. I observed nothing that would indicate an infringement on a voter's rights. All voters were treated with respect. I witnessed a poll worker physically assist a disabled voter in getting to the correct precinct table and overheard a voter being greeted in Spanish by a poll worker.

Did you understand the counting process and did you feel that the ballots were being counted with integrity in a timely manner? Please explain.

As a poll observer, I did not witness the counting process.

Was there anything that bothered you about this process either at the polls or at the counting center? Please explain.

Nothing concerned me in the least about the process at the polls It made me incredibly proud to be an American and to have folks like Katheryn and Dinah protecting this precious right.

Would you like to meet in order to discuss the election process? Not necessary.





MPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY COUNTY COUNSEL PROPOSITION A MAMMOTH LAKES FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

California Government Code section 53978 authorizes any local agency providing fire protection services to propose, by ordinance, a special tax for fire protection services provided by the local agency. Pursuant to this authority, the governing body of the Mammoth Lakes Fire Protection District proposes, through "Proposition A," to impose a special tax on real property located within the Mammoth Lakes Fire Protection District. The specific details of the proposed tax are set forth in Ordinance 2018-01 of the District Board of Commissioners. The Ordinance (and the tax it imposes) will take effect only if it is approved by two-thirds of the District voters voting on the matter.

Proposition A would impose a flat parcel tax of \$79.00 on all taxable parcels located within the Mammoth Lakes Fire Protection District.

The special tax would be levied once during the 2018-19 fiscal year at flat rates based on the use of each taxable parcel of real-property, and then levied once during each fiscal year thereafter with percentage adjustments (either increasing or decreasing the amount of the tax) based on the percentage change (if any) during the preceding 12-month period in the Consumer Price Index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, United States Department of Labor.

A "Yes" vote on Proposition A approves the proposed special tax on all taxable parcels within the Mammoth Lakes Fire Protection District for fire protection services.

A "No" vote on Proposition A disapproves the proposed special tax on all taxable parcels within the Mammoth Lakes Fire Protection District for fire protection services.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY COUNTY COUNSEL BOND MEASURE B MAMMOTH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

Measure B is proposed by the Board of Education ("Board") of the Mammoth Unified School District ("District"). Pursuant to the California Constitution and Education Code section 15247, a school district may issue general obligation bonds if approved by 55% (or more) of the voters of the District. This measure would authorize the District to issue and sell bonds up to \$63,100,000 in aggregate principal amount to provide financing for specific school facilities projects listed on the BOND PROJECT LIST in the measure. It would also qualify the District to receive State matching funds, subject to the accountability safeguards specified in the measure. The Board has certified that it has evaluated the safety, class size reduction and information technology needs of the District in developing the Bond Project List.

The proceeds from these bonds may be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and employee salaries and other school operating expenses. Approval of the bond measure does not guarantee that bonds will provide sufficient funds to allow completion of all listed projects and inclusion of a project on the Bond Project List is not a guarantee that the project will be completed (regardless of whether bond funds are available).

By law the Board must establish an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are properly expended for items in the Bond Project List. In addition, the Board must conduct annual, independent financial audits of the bond proceeds until all proceeds have been spent for the projects listed on the Bond Project List.

If the bonds are approved, the District expects to issue the bonds in multiple series over time. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies on taxable real property in the District. These taxes would be in addition to the normal property taxes levied on taxpayers in the District. The amount of the increased taxes each year will depend upon the amount needed to pay the principal and interest on the bonds.

According to the Tax Rate Statement, the District estimates that the average annual tax rate that would be levied to fund this bond issue over the duration of the bond debt service is 5.434 cents

GLEASON V. BOWEN, ET AL.

Case filed in 2014 against Registrars of Voters in 57 counties, including Mono.

Lawsuit alleges that the Registrars improperly disqualified signatures on petitions to qualify a voter initiative that would have repealed AB 1266 – state law allowing schoolchildren to use restrooms that correspond to their gender identity.

Defending this litigation has involved significant County Counsel time over the years: responding to discovery, drafting pleadings, coordinating with other County defendants, etc.

Mono worked with Plaintiffs to achieve dismissal in February. One other county has since been dismissed. 55 counties remain in the litigation.

Mono County Public Records Act Policy for Private Devices and Accounts Adopted December 12, 2017

1. Purpose and Applicability

1.1 Purpose. The County of Mono is committed to transparency and compliance with the California Public Records Act (CPRA). This policy is intended to address the County's public records that may exist outside of the County's electronic and communications systems, i.e., residing on private devices or accounts.

1.2 Applicability. This policy applies to 'Personally Owned Devices' (PODs) and associated Authorized Users - County employees, elected and appointed officials, officers and others who are in possession of "public records" residing in their private electronic devices or private electronic accounts or which are otherwise stored outside of the County's electronic and communications systems.

1.3 Public Records. "Public records" have been defined as any writing that relates in some substantive way to the conduct of the public business, regardless of physical form or characteristics. Such records may include, but are not limited to, email, word documents, photographs, text messages, voicemail, or other similar records that are stored outside of the County's electronic and communications systems. The 2017 California Supreme Court case, *City of San Jose v. Superior Court* ((2017) 2 Cal.5th 608) held that this definition includes records that are stored on private accounts outside of the County's electronic and communications systems.

RECORDS RETENTION AND PUBLIC RECORDS ACT POLICIES



Mono County Record Retention and Destruction Policy Adopted December 12, 2017

ARTICLE I CONDITIONS FOR DESTRUCTION APPLICABLE TO ALL RECORDS

Section 1.0.1. The County officer authorizing destruction or disposition must determine that the record has no further administrative value.

Section 1.0.2. All records dated 1910 and earlier and all other records of apparent historical significance shall be offered to local historical societies in Mono County and then to the State of California Historical Preservation Commission or other state historical societies for preservation for historical purposes. If the offer is refused or not acted upon within thirty (30) days, the records may be destroyed pursuant to this resolution. Alternatively to destruction, the records may be given to any member of the public.

Section 1.0.3. Where federal or state funds have been furnished, authority to destroy a record must be secured from the appropriate federal or state agency if the record is required to be retained by the terms of the agreement or law by which the funds have been furnished.

Section 1.0.4. Reproduction means preserved in any form of communication or representation, including optical, electronic, magnetic, micrographic, or photographic media or other technology capable of accurately producing or reproducing the original record, in accordance with regulations adopted by the California Secretary of State for the preservation and reproduction of the medium.



Dear Mayor Garcetti,

I am writing to express my concern about the proposal to dewater Mono County ranchlands and the potential impacts to wetlands, species, and their habitat. Recent letters to you from Mono County describe potentially devastating impacts to the natural environment, habitat and wildlife if the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) pursues its proposal to upend 70 years of water management policy and practice by eliminating irrigation and stock water from its ranch leases. In addition, and most urgently, I request your assistance in obtaining an immediate commitment to provide a water allocation this year to these ranchlands commensurate with current snowpack and water conditions.

The proposal by LADWP to dry up 6,200 acres of historic agricultural land in Mono County would have significant consequences to wildlife by destroying wetlands and riparian areas, and eliminating habitat for sensitive species such as the bi-state sage grouse. The loss of water would also significantly increase the risk of wildfires, which would threaten nearby communities.
