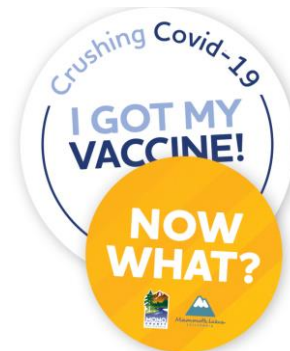




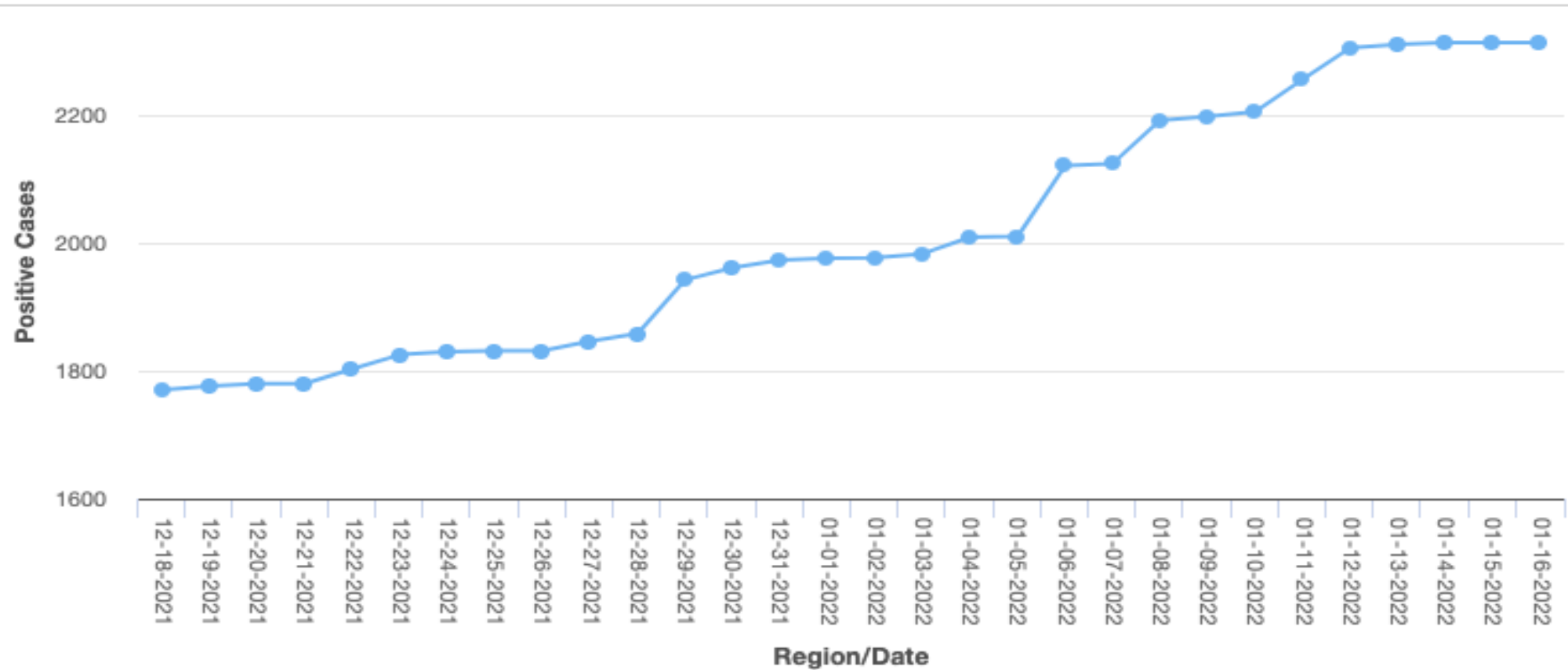

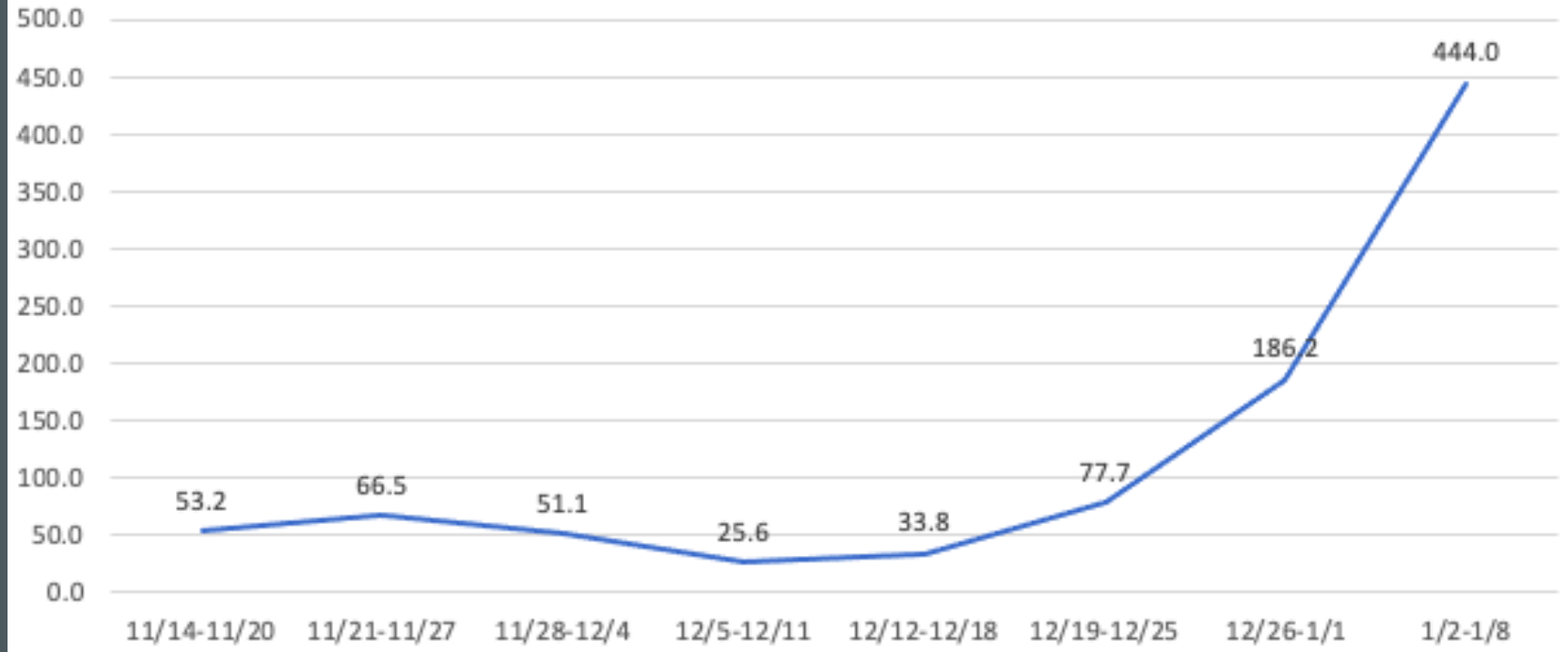
Total Positive Cases for Mono County Residents (last 30 d...



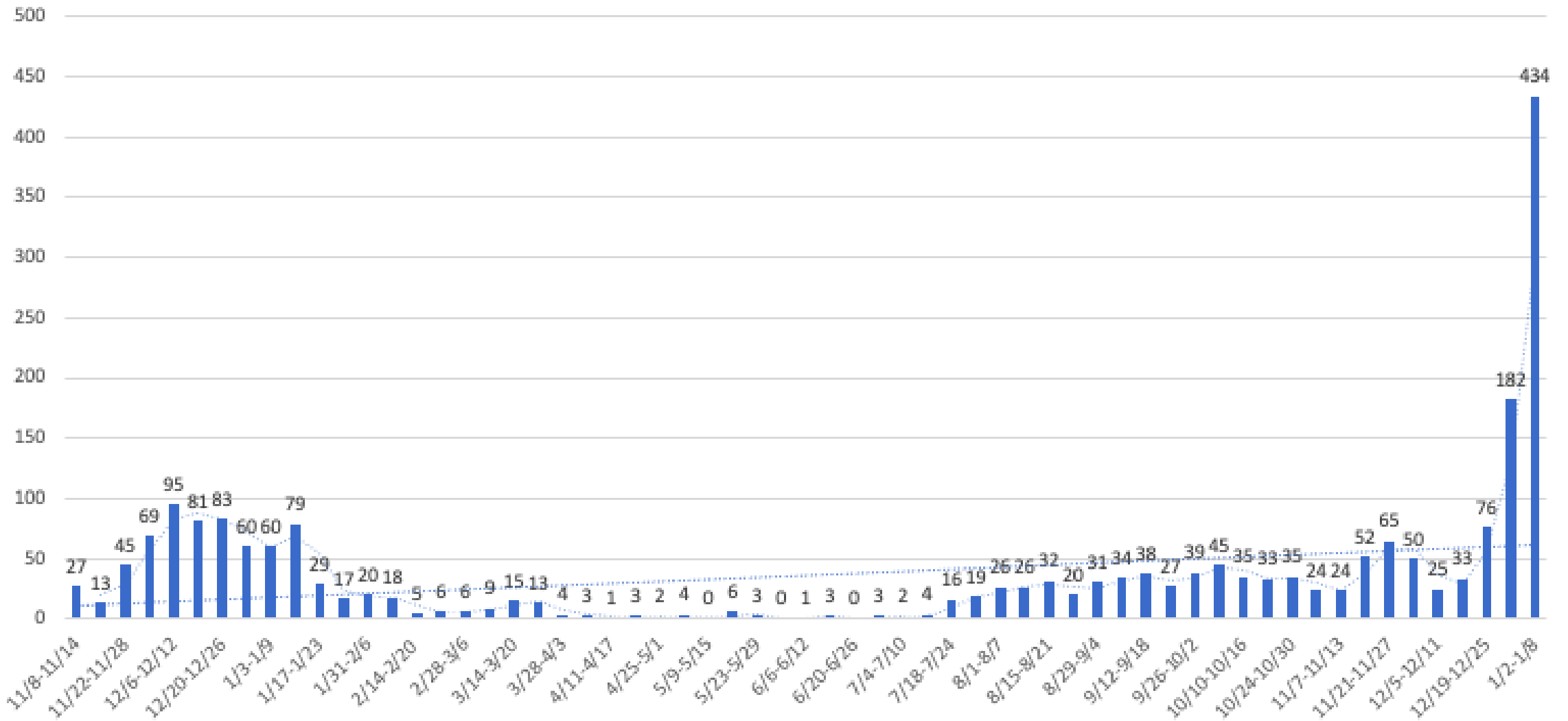
TOTAL POSITIVE CASES (PCR CONF): 2464 POSITIVITY RATE: 43% / CASE RATE/100,000: 444.0

BOOSTER DATA

- 3656+ COVID-19 third doses have been administered to Mono County Residents.

HOSPITAL STATUS

- High of 3, low of 1 COVID-19 related hospitalizations over the past week
- Difficulty transferring patients
- Seeing many ski related injuries and multiple COVID-19 cases daily
- Staffing shortage
- Status = Green.

COVID DEATH

- A Mono County resident passed away from Covid in early January.

NEW ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE GUIDANCE

If You Test Positive for COVID-19 (Isolate)

- **Everyone, regardless of vaccination status:**
 - [Stay home](#) (PDF) for at least 5 days.
 - Isolation can end after day 5 if symptoms are not present or are resolving **and** a diagnostic specimen* collected on day 5 or later tests negative.
 - If unable to test or choosing not to test, and symptoms are not present or are resolving, isolation can end after day 10.
 - If fever is present, isolation should be continued until fever resolves.
 - If symptoms, other than fever, are not resolving continue to isolate until symptoms are resolving or until after day 10.
 - Wear a well-fitting mask around others for a total of 10 days, especially in indoor settings (see Section below on masking for additional information)
- **Antigen test preferred.*

NEW ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE GUIDANCE

If You Were Exposed to COVID-19 (Quarantine)

- [Stay home](#) (PDF) for at least 5 days, after your last contact with a person who has COVID-19.
- Test on day 5.
- Quarantine can end after day 5 if symptoms are not present **and** a diagnostic specimen collected on day 5 or later tests negative.
- If unable to test or choosing not to test, and symptoms are not present, quarantine can end after day 10.
- Wear a well-fitting mask around others for a total of 10 days, especially in indoor settings (see Section below on masking for additional information).
- Strongly encouraged to get vaccinated or boosted.
- If testing positive, follow isolation recommendations above.
- If symptoms develop, test and stay home.

NEW ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE GUIDANCE

If You Were Exposed to COVID-19 (No Quarantine) If Boosted or not yet eligible for a booster

- Test on day 5.
- Wear a well-fitting mask around others for 10 days, especially in indoor settings (see Section below on masking for additional information)
- If testing positive, follow isolation recommendations above.
- If symptoms develop, test and stay home.

HIGH-QUALITY MASKING GUIDANCE

- The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has changed its masking guidelines to recommend that people "wear the most protective mask you can that fits well and that you will wear consistently." The agency describes well-fitting respirators approved by the National Institute of Occupational Safety & Health (NIOSH) -- such as N95 masks -- as offering "the highest level of protection."
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
