Sage-grouse Initiative Overview

2010 NRCS launched the Sage-grouse Initiative

- A highly targeted and science based landscape approach to delivering enough of the right conservation practices in the right places to elicit a positive sage-grouse population response.
 - This Initiative has proven attractive to agricultural producers as a voluntary, incentive based approach to achieving wildlife conservation through sustainable ranching.
 - SGI uses dedicated Farm Bill conservation program funds at appropriate large scales to alleviate threats that otherwise fragment habitats.
- Utilized EQIP and WHIP Conservation Programs
- Completed a SGI Conference Report with USFWS.
 - 40 conservation practices



2011 NRCS added conservation easements.

2014 ESA Predictability

Provide ranchers and other private landowners with regulatory certainty that conservation investments they make today help sustain their operations over the long term.

2015 CSP is being added to SGI

- ❖ NRCS is piloting use of its Conservation Stewardship Program
- Similar to regular CSP, but with a Sage-grouse focus






















Partnering State Agencies
