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Mono County Board of Supervisors Proclaims May as National Wildfire Awareness Month

MONO COUNTY, CA – May 20, 2025 – Earlier this month, the Mono County Board of Supervisors adopted a proclamation recognizing the month of May as National Wildfire Awareness Month. Mono County is situated in a high-risk wildfire environment and the Board understands that implementing measures that will prevent or mitigate the threat of wildfires is paramount to protecting lives, property, and natural resources.

With many local events co-sponsored by Mono County (<u>whitebarkinstitute.org/events/</u>) underway through the end of the month, National Wildfire Awareness Month is dedicated to educating the public about wildfire safety, mitigation, and the steps individuals and communities can take to reduce their risk.

A key initiative is the County's Firewise USA program, which empowers neighborhoods to work together to reduce wildfire risks by taking pragmatic, effective steps that have been proven to significantly reduce the loss of property and lives in the event of a wildfire. Through this program, communities can learn about creating defensible space, implementing critical and accessible home hardening techniques, and developing evacuation plans.
