

Elections Division Update -- Election Day, June 3rd, is only 18 days away. Preparing for an election is a total team effort, and in the Clerk's Office everyone contributes—either by supporting others and taking on additional duties, or through direct involvement in planning for the Big Day. Community Development

Local Transportation Commission – At its Monday meeting the LTC approved adjustments to operating procedures to invite Caltrans to the table, provided direction to Ryan Dermody and Gerry Le Francois on Mono's priority STIP project to combine North Conway passing lane with Bridgeport passing lanes, determined unmet transit needs with Wendy Sugimura, amended the Overall Work Plan with Megan Mahaffey, and received quarterly status reports from the Town, Caltrans and Mono County (Garrett Higerd).

Mono Basin RPAC – Following lengthy review of Conway Ranch matters on Wednesday with Tony Dublino, Marshall Rudolph and Supervisors Hunt and Alpers, the RPAC approved a letter of support for pedestrian and safe routes to school improvement via an Active Transportation Program grant, favorably received a report on improvements to the Mono City emergency access road, and reviewed the Housing Element update.

Bridgeport Valley RPAC – At Thursday's meeting members received a report from Supervisor Fesko, an update on Mountain Warfare Training Center from Doug Power, and a report of USFS activities from Jeff Ulrich. The RPAC also approved a letter of support for the Alternative Transportation Program grant, received an update by Stacey Simon on Walker River water rights, and supported the concept of thermal biomass project at the County road shop presented by Wendy Sugimura.

California State Association of Counties legislative Conference reflects better state finances but need to repay counties for past due mandate costs – On May 14th and 15th, Chairman Larry K. Johnston and I attended the annual CSAC legislative conference in Sacramento. The Supervisors and staff from across the state received briefings from Mac Taylor, head of the legislative Analyst's Office, the leaders of the Senate and assembly (including their Budget Chairs) and a detailed update on the drought from the Deputy Director of the Department of Water Resources.

The State Budget is showing signs of balance and the Governor has proposed to start paying back counties for past due costs owed for mandated services. California Counties are owed over &600 million and this Budget proposes \$100 million. It remains to be seen if the legislature will keep the Governor's request but this repayment is overdue and would help counties with the Budget woes.

The drought is already being felt as water supplies through the state are starting to reduce. The State water project is not releasing nearly the amounts it normally would and wildfire season began in earnest this week as San Diego saw nine fires start in three days. It's going to be a long summer ...

USFS Pacific Southwest Region Reschedules Workshops on Forest Plan Revisions - VALLEJO, Calif., May 15, 2014 – The U.S. Forest Service will host a series of public workshops for forest plan revisions on the Sierra, Sequoia and Inyo National Forests. The meetings were originally scheduled for April 7, 8 and 10.

These workshops follow those the Forest Service hosted in January. At those workshops, the public provided feedback on the Forest Service's preliminary *Need to Change*, Draft Roles and Contributions, and example Desired Conditions.

The public is welcome at any of the three upcoming workshops:

Each workshop will be held from 5-8 p.m. with presentations by Forest Service staff. The public will have time to visit topic-specific stations and to talk with Forest Service staff. Additionally, the public is invited to bring an $8 \% \times 11$ inch copy of a photo depicting Forest Service lands they have strong feelings about. This photo may be recent or historic. Photos will be shared at the "Desired Conditions" station and the public should be able to answer the following questions regarding their photos:

- 1. Where was the photo taken?
- 2. When was the photo taken?
- 3. What do you like about this place?
- 4. Does this picture need to change? If so, how and when should this happen?

The planning rule provides the framework for Forest Service land management plans across the nation.
